SUICIDE PREVENTION AWARENESS

Construction Suicide Prevention Week is September 14th through 18th.

I'd like to take the opportunity to bring awareness to the realities of suicide in the construction industry and to provide our members with the facts and resources needed to seek and offer support in times of crisis. I hope that this will bring open conversations, the ability to notice when someone is struggling and to remind our members that there is support available when they need it.

There is no single cause of suicide, and everyone's circumstances are different. But working in the trades can come with challenges that take a toll over time. Unpredictable work, time away from family, financial pressures, long hours, injuries and chronic pain are realities many carpenters may face throughout their careers. There can also be a tendency to keep pushing through and get the job done, even when things are difficult. That determination is something to be proud of, but no one should feel like they have to carry everything alone.

If there is one thing I hope you take away from this article, it's to check in on the people around you. If someone doesn't seem like themselves, or they are going through a difficult time or says something that concerns you, ask them how they're doing. Take a few minutes to listen. If they tell you they're struggling, take it seriously. You don't have to know exactly what to say, and you don't have to solve their problems. Sometimes the most important thing you can do is listen, stay connected and help them find the support they need. And if you're the one having a hard time, the same applies to you. Talk to someone you trust like a family member, friend, co-worker, or another person you feel comfortable reaching out to.
